Claim's

What does it mean to make a claim? How can we study this word?

BLD: Blacks Law Dictionary, :Claim:

- 1. A statement that something yet to be proved is true <claim's of torture>.
- The assertion of an existing right; any right to payment or to an equitable remedy, even if contingent or provisional <the spouse's claim to half of the lottery winnings>.
- 3. A demand for money, property, or legal remedy to which one asserts a right; esp., the part of a complaint in a civil action specifying what relief the plaintiff asks for. -Also termed claim for relief (1808).
- 4. An interest or remedy recognized at law, the means by which a person can obtain a privileged, possession, or enjoyment of a right or thing.

The Vatican; Canon law (color of law) declare, :Claim:

- 1. Article-70,canon1800: Any juridic person or court that permits the resolution of claims and counter-claims merely by documents without either the original and subsequent claims being vocalized is in grave breach of a most ancient and fundamental principle of law.
- 2. Article-70,canon1801: When in accordance with these canons, a person who is first in time has the prior right of claim.

Oxford Advanced American Dictionary declare: :Claim:

- 1. [transitive] to say that something is true although it has not been proved and other people may not believe it.
 - * claim (that)... He claims (that) he was not given a fair hearing.
 - * claim (somebody/something) to be/do something. *I* don't claim to be an expert.
 - * claim, something Scientists are claiming a major breakthrough in the fight against cancer.
 - * it is claimed that... some doctors were working 80

hours a week.

While trying to understand the full meaning of the concept of claim, let's make a different approach. Let us instead questioning ourselves: -What are the consequence of never making a claim?

Can I be Sovereign without claiming that in the first place? What about freedom of speech? ... do I have it? Is it real? is it working? How do I now if I never use it? How do I know that I have free will ,,, if I never use it? Can you ever be free, reach a state of freedom, without making that claim?

Well... if you never ever claim anything, you'll find yourself "up over your ears" with consent's to others claims and demands... don't you? Because, the absence of your will automatically places you under somebody else's. It is called consent. So action or non-action, of claim, is in a way opposite on the consent or non-consent.
